### Information for Parents/Carers - Head injuries - ALWAYS inform us if your child was hurt outside school



Signs and symptoms of concussion Signs of a concussion usually appear within a few minutes or hours of a head injury. But occasionally they may not be obvious for a few days, so it's important to look out for any problems in the days following a head injury. Symptoms include:

- a headache that does not go away or is not relieved with painkillers
- dizziness
- feeling or being sick
- memory loss you may not remember what happened before or after the injury
- clumsiness or trouble with balance
- unusual behaviour becoming irritated easily or sudden mood swings
- feeling stunned, dazed or confused, or struggling to stay awake
- changes in your vision such as blurred vision, double vision or "seeing stars"

Concussion can be harder to spot in babies and young children. Important symptoms to look out for are changes in their normal behaviour after a head injury, such as:

- crying a lot
- differences in their feeding or sleeping habits
- a loss of interest in people or objects

# School photo information for Parents/Carers

#### School photos

Children had their **class group photos** and **individual photos** taken Wednesday 5 May. All parents/carers should have **received a ticket for their child** sent by the photographers, Kittle. **The ticket** has details on **how to view the photos and purchase, if desired**.

Contact details are on the ticket for Kittle who manage all enquiries (the school holds no tickets/details).

#### I didn't receive my ticket/I lost it - What should I do?

**Don't worry**. By Friday 14 May the school should receive DUPLICATE tickets/photo proofs to send home with your child, for ordering (if desired).

#### What happens after I have ordered online with Kittle?

If you order by Friday 21 May 202, Kittle will guarantee to send your photo order to the school (for you to collect) with no additional postage costs. If you are unable to do this, you can still order photos to be delivered direct to your home address but you will need to pay additional costs for post and packaging.

#### What if my child was ill/not at school?

The school hopes to have Kittle back to do more photographs in November 2021 and your child will be prioritised then for an individual photo.
