Yes... it's half term already. As they say, time flies when you are having fun, and we certainly are having lots of fun here in school.



A day in Reception






Year 4

Ramadan

- Ramadan is the <u>ninth</u> month of the Islamic calendar and the holiest month in Islam.
 Ramadan begins when the new moon is seen.
- During the month of Ramadan, Muslims fast for the entire month from dawn to dusk. This means healthy grown ups, who are Muslims, do not eat or drink anything, including water, during the day while the sun shines.
- For Muslims, fasting is one of the five pillars (essential religious duties) of their faith.
 Fasting teaches self-control, encourages a focus on prayer and allows them to devote their attention to worship, and get closer to Allah.
- During Ramadan, Muslims try to say more prayers and try to read the Holy Quran more, so they gain Allah's favour and get closer to Allah. Muslims believe that Ramadan is a month of great blessings and mercy from Allah. It is the month of forgiveness.
- Muslims believe that during the month of Ramadan, their holy book (the Quran) was sent from Allah to guide the people.
- Eid-ul-fitr is the first day of the new month after Ramadan. Muslim families celebrate
 Eid-ul-Fitr by wearing new clothes and going to the Mosque for the morning prayer.
 They prepare different kinds of foods like samosas, pakoras, kebabs and more.
 They visit their friends and family and children may receive gifts of money, new
 clothes and toys.
- On Eid day, Muslim people say "Eid Mubarak!" which means "Have a Blessed Eid!"



Girls football focus - Nike Academy

- Girls from all over Haringey had a 4 week trial to qualify for the
 Nike girls' academy football scheme
- The scheme's aims are to boost girls football nationally and enhance girls football in general
- Only 3 students from every school that participate can go through to the next stage
- On this occasion, they chose 8 of our amazing girls instead of 3 as they had such fantastic football skills!
- The 8 girls who were chosen to move to the next stage had their first introduction meeting on Monday 24th May 2021 at the Broadwater Farm Community Centre.
- The next stage: The girls will train with the other girls from Haringey to get through to the final stage of the process.
- The final stage: The girls chosen for the final, will receive free
 Nike football boots, sports coaching and get a chance to be part
 of a girls football team playing regular matches

A year since...

It has been a year since George Floyd was killed in police custody in the US, an event which sparked protests around the world.

He was an unarmed black man who was stopped by police in Minneapolis and died after being held down by a police officer.

The officer involved, Derek Chauvin, lost his job and was later found guilty of George Floyd's murder.

Floyd's death led to lots of debate about racism and inequality and there were big Black Lives Matter marches in lots of countries calling for changes to policing, education and culture.

In assembly on Tuesday, a minutes silence was held to remember and reflect.

Paid music lessons for your child in school - 1:1 or shared with another child

CURRENT SCALE OF CHARGES as follows, although children can qualify for <u>free lessons if there is proof of free school meals</u> (ie in receipt of income support/universal credit) is given:

10 x 20 minute *individual* lessons £110.00

10 x 30 minute *individual* lessons £165.00

10 x 30 minute *paired* lessons * £82.50

* only possible with sibling or child in the same bubble at the moment

Relationships and sex education (RSE) and health education

RSE will continue to be taught following our scheme of work (1 Decision). We have consulted with parents and the overwhelming majority feel happy with the policy and implementation of our RSE curriculum. The RSE Lead and Assistant Head Teacher will be contacting those parents who needed some further clarification after half term. As always, letters will go out to Year 5 and 6 parents in the Summer term, informing them how and when we are teaching RSE and giving them the choice to opt out if they so choose.



Pick up at the end of the day

From 8th June, KS1 and Year 4 parents can collect children from the playground. Families still come in and leave at Moira Close. The morning drop off at the Moira close gate will remain the same.

We ask that all parents wear a mask on the school site.

Keep social distance rules.

Staggered times will remain, so please only come into the school playground at your allocated time.

Please do not use this time to speak to teachers. If you need to speak to the teacher at the end of the day, you MUST wear a MASK (staff will not talk to parents/carers not wearing a mask, unless you are exempt). For general information, please continue to email or call the school.

Did you know... Interesting Facts about our School and local area...

- There has been a settlement at Tottenham for over a thousand years.
- Tottenham was made an urban district in 1894.
- We moved into the Reception and KS1 (pink) side of the new building in September 2011 (10 years ago this September)
- Broadwater Farm Estate started to be built in 1967
- There are over 700 Broadwaters' children (The Willow, The Brook and The Children Centre)
- Broadwater Farm Community Centre was opened in 1992.
- Over 35 languages are spoken by The Willow families (Turkish being the largest after English).
- Lordship Rec won a Heritage Lottery Fund in 2007 which was used to redevelop the The Rec (City Farm, BMX track, Model Traffic Area, Restoration of the Shell Theatre, Eco-centre)
- Our children and their families come from over 50 different countries.
- BWF is built on the River Moselle.
- Tottenham is said to be one of the most diverse areas in Europe and maybe even the world!
- Bernie Grant was one of the first Black MPs (Member of Parliament). He was the MP for Tottenham from 1987 to April 2000.


