Dear Parents and Carers

As we move into February, half term is now only a week away and the Christmas holiday seems a distant memory. We are aware that the level of illness amongst both children and staff has been very high this half term – and mostly nothing to do with COVID. It is always a balancing act to decide whether your child is well enough to be in school and we are very appreciative of your efforts to ensure that infections are not spread across the school.

Absences

Please do remember that we must have a reason for an absence so that it can be authorised. Telling an escort is useful but the school needs to be contacted directly as we have very stringent processes we must follow if we do not know why a child is away, or we cannot make contact with the family. This is part of our safeguarding responsibility and we take safeguarding incredibly seriously. We also have had some families with personal issues which has required them to take their child out of school for a short while. Again, it is essential that that is discussed with school before any action is taken as it is a legal requirement for children to be in school during term time and permission must be given for any reduction in those days for anything other than illness and medical appointments.

Strike Days

Thank you for your understanding of why members of the NEU took strike action this week. The issue for schools is funding. As you know, we get given our money from the Government and



unlike businesses we cannot find ways of getting more income in. We have not had any significant additional income from the Government for six years and yet food prices, heating and lighting, buying resources etc. have gone up every year. You will also know that we kept the school open during COVID and in order to do that and keep both children and staff safe, we had to spend all of our reserves. We were committed to that course of action but are very disappointed that we were not given any additional money to cover the cost.

Teachers strike very reluctantly but the reality of the situation is that, if more money does not come into our school, we will not be able to give our children the academic and life chances that we currently do yet alone ensuring they have a substantial and nutritional lunch.

We appreciate that strikes are contentious issues and please feel free to come and discuss the situation with us if you are wanting more clarification or information.

Successes

You will see later in this newsletter that we have been awarded the GREEN FLAG for our work on sustainability and also the Leading parent partnership award. We have also been commended for our Global curriculum work with the Erasmus project in which we have been given a certificate that we will put up proudly. Congratulations to everyone involved in these marvellous achievements.

However you spend half term, we hope that it is an enjoyable time. School restarts for our children on Monday 20th February – normal time.









HARINGEY LTNs (Lower Traffic Neighborhood)
















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
