ABOUT THE WATERLOO ROOM

The Waterloo Room with its magnificent tower at The Elms is a Regency Banqueting Hall that was built to commemorate the defeat of Napoleon at the Battle of Waterloo. It was built by Sir Theophilus Lea, a relative of the Duke of Wellington.

The Manor Trust Bedhampton (Registered Charity 1116034) was set up in 1967 to preserve The Elms with its Waterloo Room .

The Elms is a Grade II 'Star' Listed Building, making it in the top 8% of Listed Buildings in the country.

The Tower of the Waterloo Room was restored to its original glory by the Manor Trust in 2015, and the exterior of The Elms was repaired and repainted in 2018. The charity has also been doing much internally to maintain the five separate apartments for the retired. It is planned next to renew the roof of the Waterloo Room that is in a deteriorating state, make repairs to the north wall and then to redecorate the interior.

When repairing Listed Buildings, traditional materials have to be used and these cost more. It is for this reason that we appeal to the public to give what they can so the work can be done.
