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REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2017

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 30 June 2017. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims and Public Benefit

The Wessex Chalk Stream and Rivers Trust is dedicated to the guardianship, protection, enhancement and maintenance of healthy, functioning ecosystems within the river catchments and corridors of the Wessex region.

Its vision is of healthy rivers within the Wessex region which are valued and nurtured by the community and which exhibit:-

- Sustainable and natural abundant wildlife
- High water quality and sustainable natural flows
- Fully functioning ecosystems which link the rivers and their valleys
- Resilience to climate change and future stresses associated with social and economic development

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2017

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities

The four primary areas of activity are education, catchment management, river restoration and a modest science programme. In addition the Trust spends a limited amount of time on advocacy.

Education

The principal aim of the Trust's work in education is to inform and build awareness of the importance and fragility of river habitats and to inspire a sense of value for them in schools and in the broader community. During this year the Trust has hired a part-time Education Officer to assist with its education programme.

The Trust continued to work in collaboration with Winchester College on the River Itchen as part of their outreach programme to deliver an introduction to ecology and hydrology to primary school pupils. The programme was run in Autumn 2016 and repeated in Spring 2017. Over 500 primary school children have now participated in this programme.

Catchment Management and hosting of Catchment Partnerships

Since September 2013 the Trust has hosted the Hampshire Avon Catchment Partnership and co-hosted, working with the Hampshire & Isle of Wight Wildlife Trust, the Test and Itchen Catchment Partnership. The aim of these partnerships, which have been established under DEFRA's Catchment Based Approach initiative, is to obtain the engagement and participation of all relevant stakeholders in prioritising and implementing actions to bring about ecological improvements to the rivers and other water bodies within the relevant catchment. This includes NGOs, farmers, user groups such as angling clubs and wildlife organisations, local government, the Environment Agency and Natural England, water companies and other private sector businesses. Necessarily this embraces activities across the catchments, not just in the river channels.

Two Catchment Officers are employed by the Trust principally to manage the day to day affairs of the two partnerships under the supervision of the Trust Director. Core groups comprising representatives of the key delivery organisations (NGOs, government and private sector) have been established to provide direction to the partnerships. Broader stakeholders representing a wide spectrum of interests have given their views on issues and priorities for action. A Catchment Action Plan has been prepared for each catchment, identifying short, medium and long term priorities.

The Trust has been involved in a number of catchment partnership activities during the year, including:

- Environment Agency funded projects on sediment management and habitat restoration for coarse fish and salmonids in both the Avon and Test and Itchen Catchments.
- The Test and Itchen Catchment Partnership hosts have led the development of a successful Heritage Lottery Fund bid to fund future activity in the upper catchments of the two rivers. This includes river habitat improvement work, improving water quality and developing a citizen science programme with local communities.
- The Hampshire Avon Catchment Partnership won the National River Restoration Centre (RRC) catchment management prize. In addition, the partners were awarded the National RRC River Restoration Trophy.
- The Trust has continued to invest in training for its Catchment Officers in a range of skills including ecological surveys, practical habitat management and catchment management.

The Trust also continues to play a role in the Dorset Stour Catchment Partnership, co-hosted by Dorset Wildlife Trust and Wessex Water, assisting with prioritisation of issues and the delivery on a habitat project for fish. The Research Officer contributed to this.

River Restoration (including Conservation and Habitat Enhancement Activities)

River restoration has continued to be a significant and increasing area of activity for the Trust. This includes habitat projects for coarse fish, salmonids, eels, and wider biodiversity. Work was completed at sites on the Upper Avon and Lower Avon. Project planning to develop a future pipeline of projects has been undertaken.

The Catchment Officers as well as the Director have increasingly worked on both water quality and river restoration project delivery which has included:

- Completing implementation of a programme of work to install 14 eel passes with funding from the waste management company Veolia. Further work has been planned at Broadlands on the Lower Test.
- The planning of two fish passes at Holbury and Lockerley on the River Dun, a River Test tributary, was completed.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE Charitable activities

The Director served on the Project Board for the delivery of the River Avon Restoration Plan.

Science

The Trust has worked with the Avon Demonstration Test Catchment and held events focusing on the threats and solutions to water quality problems.

The Trust used the research outputs from the catchment invertebrate fingerprinting work to produce an accessible and informative document highlighting the issues and threats to the Avon catchment.

The Trust maintained its network of river temperature loggers across many of its catchments. In collaboration with other organisations and individuals, this data extended baseline temperature information on particular river reaches. The Trust's temperature data is freely available via its website.

Advocacy

The Director sat on a Southern Water Hampshire and Isle of Wight water resources options group as well as a Wessex Water catchment panel.

The Chair of Trustees has been appointed to the Consumer Challenge Group for Southern Water and the Director to Southern Water's Stakeholder Panel.

The Director also sits on a number of local groups including Wiltshire Fishery Association and has regular meetings with EA senior management.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Wessex Chalk Stream and Rivers Trust was incorporated in February 2009. The company has adopted a 30 June year end.

Total income in the Trust's year to 30 June 2017 covering both restricted use and unrestricted use funds was £359,204 (£412,385) and expenditure was £245,387 (£311,380). Income therefore exceeded expenditure by £113,817 (£101,005); split £67,649 unrestricted use funds and £46,168 restricted use funds.

Net assets of the Trust as at 30 June 2017 amounted to £298,243 (£184,426) which consisted predominately of cash.

The Trust is a not for profit organisation. Whilst as at 30 June 2017 it is reporting a healthy surplus of income over expenditure it should be noted this included funds received but earmarked for specific projects the costs for which will be incurred in the year 2017/18.

The trustees' reserves policy is to maintain reserves at a level that would permit the Trust to cover business overheads for a period of at least three months in the case of unforeseen events.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust, and constitutes a limited company, limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006.

The Trust is supported by approximately 280 ordinary, life, founder and other supporters. Ordinary supporters pay an annual amount towards the work of the Trust, plus in some cases extra donations are received.

Overall responsibility for the running of the Wessex Chalk Stream and Rivers Trust rests with the Board of Trustees which is limited to twenty trustees. Trustees are elected and appointed by the Board. The trustees appoint their own chair from within their ranks.

The Trust has a full time Director, Dr. Paul Jose. The Trust also employs two full-time Catchment Officers: Liam Reynolds for the Hampshire Avon catchment and Andrew Blincow (recently appointed) for the Test and Itchen catchments, a part-time Education Officer, Veronika Moore, and a part-time administrator, Lee Bush. The Trust has a volunteer Treasurer (Paddy Douglas-Pennant) and volunteer Research Officer (Jon Bass). The Trust also makes regular use of the services of Ses Wright in a consultancy capacity.

Sub-committees and working groups have been established consisting mainly of individual trustees and the Director covering specific issues such as fund raising.

Risk management

The trustees have a duty to identify and review the risks to which the charity is exposed and to ensure appropriate controls are in place to provide reasonable assurance against fraud and error. The trustees have undertaken to review these risks regularly at the Annual General Meeting.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2017

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

The financial statements are presented in Sterling, which is also the functional currency of the company.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds.

Donations are included when received.

Income from grants is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds.

Membership income, including life membership, is included on a receipts basis. All other income is included on an accruals basis.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis, inclusive of VAT which cannot be recovered, and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Expenditure on charitable activities comprises those costs associated with education, research, advocacy, conservation and habitat enhancement.

Governance costs include those costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the charity and include the independent examination fees. Governance costs are no longer shown as a separate expense category but are allocated between expense categories accordingly. The comparative figures are adjusted accordingly.

Other expenditure represents those items not falling into any other heading.

The trustees carry out fundraising on behalf of the charity free of charge.

Taxation

The company is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in note 8 to the financial statements.

Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

Contributions payable by the charitable company are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.

Wessex Salmon and Rivers Trust - Net assets received from the Wessex Salmon and Rivers Trust, a charity which has been dissolved, which are to be used for the purpose of the continuation of Wessex Salmon and Rivers Trust's projects, namely:-trout in schools, salmon hatchery, combating invasive species, purchase of salmon scales from the Muddeford nets and river temperature project.

Rivers Test & Itchen Catchment Based Approach joint hosting - Funds received from contributors to co-host the Test & Itchen Catchment Partnership with the Hampshire & Isle of Wight Wildlife Trust, a Defra national initiative to obtain the engagement and participation of all relevant stakeholders in prioritising and implementing actions to bring about ecological improvements to the rivers and other water bodies within the relevant catchment.

River Avon Catchment Based Approach hosting - Funds received from contributors to host the River Avon Catchment Partnership, a Defra national initiative to obtain the engagement and participation of all relevant stakeholders in prioritising and implementing actions to bring about ecological improvements to the rivers and other water bodies within the relevant catchment.

Schools and education - Funds received from contributors to educate, inform and build awareness of the importance and fragility of river habitats and to inspire a sense of value for them in the broader community.

Catchment invertebrate fingerprinting - Successfully met its objectives for the first year of the project with maps and reports being produced for the Test, Itchen and Avon catchments identifying a series of pollution hotspots. These were used to target projects including work to address sediment issues on both the Avon and Test/Itchen. However, the Esmee Fairbairn Foundation, due to a change in funding protocol, has not continued to fund this activity.

River Avon Catchment Partnership Action Fund - Two CPAF funded projects were delivered. These were backwater and fish habitat improvements on the Avon Tyrrell Estate on the Lower Avon and salmonid riffle improvements on the Upper Avon.

Rivers Test and Itchen Catchment Partnership Action Fund - Two CPAF funded projects were delivered. These were pilot projects on the Bourne Rivulet and Cheriton Stream surveying sediment pathways mitigation measures and collaborative work on raising awareness of phosphate levels in septic tanks.

River Stour Eve Bridge Project - The creation of a coarse fish fry bay which was successfully completed in Autumn 2015.

River Dun Holbury and Lockerley project - Planning and design of habitat restoration and fish passage upstream of the confluence of the Rivers Dun and Test.

Veolia Eels Project - The assessment of sites and installation of a number of eel passes sponsored by the waste management company, Veolia.

River Avon Catchment Management Water Quality - Funds received from the Environment Agency and natural England were partially expended on walk-over and trackway surveys. The work was ongoing at the year end.

River Avon Projects Salmon Habitat - Limited funds were received to investigate deterioration of salmon habitat. The work was ongoing at the year end.

River Avon Catchment Management Coarse Fish - Funds received from the Environment Agency were used in the creation of fry bays at Lifelands in collaboration with the Barbel Society.

Rivers Test and Itchen Catchment Management Water Quality - Costs of £8,252 relate to staff time spent on scoping possible sediment pathway projects on the Rivers Test and Itchen.

£10,000 was transferred from River Avon Catchment Partnership Fund to River Avon Catchment Management - Water Quality re income incorrectly allocated during the year ended 30 June 2016 and £7,271 was transferred from Rivers Test & Itchen Catchment Partnership Action Fund to River Dun - Holbury and Lockerley Project re expenditure incorrectly allocated during the year ended 30 June 2016.
