

UK capacity challenges

A lot of things are being blamed on Covid, but we believe that actually there are a number of unrelated developments that have come together to create a particular opportunity for non-UK universities:

- Demographic growth of the university-seeking population
- Political uncertainty and the 'third rail' of tuition fees
- The idea of the 'Russell Group' as a brand of value
- Hollowing out of expert opinion in the news media about higher education



Capacity at the more-selective universities is fixed, but we are trying to pour more students into them.

As a result, more students will 'spill over' to other universities that may not be as attractive to them (or their families).

Increasingly, we are seeing families not willing to 'settle' for what's possible in the UK, and instead looking internationally

International options

Solid data is hard to come by, but we do have some proxies.

The Independent Schools Council survey shows some good data:






Fig 36. Destination of ISC pupils attending non-UK universities: Top 10

"For the 5% of pupils who chose to study outside of the UK, the USA is by far the most popular destination attracting 47% of ISC pupils going to overseas universities, as illustrated in Figure 35. This is an increase compared with last year when 43% chose to study in the USA. ISC pupils go on to a wide range of overseas universities and this range has been expanding year on year. In 2012, fewer than 400 overseas institutions attracted ISC pupils, now there are 539. The top 10 overseas universities are illustrated in Figure 36. Finally, pupils choosing to study overseas are not confined to a small number of ISC schools. Pupils from 55% of ISC schools with Year 13 leavers go on to higher education overseas."

Proportion of all ISC pupils attending non-UK universities.

Proportion of all ISC pupils attending non-UK universities.




This year, the number of students on UCAS who were 'unplaced' went up. We believe many area students who didn't somewhere 'good enough' choosing to reapply



"Just 37.6 per cent of 18-yearolds will start degrees at UK universities this autumn, or have a deferred place to start next year, compared with 38.4 per cent last year, according to data from the Universities and Colleges Admissions Service... experts predict that the trend is likely to continue because universities cannot afford to keep enrolling growing numbers of UK teenagers. Many institutions are recruiting more overseas students, who pay fees of up to £40,000 a year on some courses."

Northeastern this cycle

"Northeastern received a record number of undergraduate applications for the 2023-24 academic year, which university officials attribute to Northeastern's expanding global footprint and leadership in experiential learning.

Northeastern received 96,327 applications for fall 2023, up from 91,100 in 2022, 75,233 in 2021 and 64,428 in 2020. That's an increase of 31,899 applicants, or 49.5%, over four years, according to Satyajit Dattagupta, the university's chief enrollment officer and senior vice chancellor.

"The Northeastern education is unparalleled—the ability to study at a premier R1 research institution that has the ability to send students all over the world to gather professional experiences before they graduate," Dattagupta says. "This unique value proposition leads to clear and measurable outcomes for families."

Northeastern has also become the No. 1 choice for many top students. Applicants for early decision—students who choose Northeastern as their first choice and agree to attend if accepted—increased 30% from last year. Since 2015, early decision applications have risen from 772 to 5,872."

- •Increase in percentage of admitted California residents = 18%
- •Decrease in percentage of admitted domestic nonresidents = 23%
- •<u>Decrease in percentage of admitted international nonresidents = 23%</u>

UC Berkeley

- •Increase in percentage of admitted California residents = 13%
- •Decrease in percentage of admitted domestic nonresidents = 24%

The UCs

Now look at the numerical increase in California resident applications to these three schools:

- •UCLA Increase in number of California resident applications = 9%
- •UC Berkeley Increase in number of California resident applications = 17%
- •UC Irvine Increase in number of California resident applications = 9%

Now, here's the kicker. The total number of admitted students declined significantly at all three campuses:

- •UCLA Total accepted students decreased by 15%
- •UC Berkeley Total accepted students decreased by 11%
- •UC Irvine Total accepted students decreased by 19%

Students are looking at other options

Rise in applications to private European universities: Bocconi and IE particularly popular.

The Netherlands

The minister of education, culture and science in the Netherlands has written to the boards of all public research and applied sciences universities, urgently requesting a halt to international student recruitment.

The letter, dated December 22 2022 and signed by Robbert Dijkgraaf, comes weeks after a parliamentary motion, spearheaded by MPs Peter Kwint and Harry van der Molen, was passed which called on Dijkgraaf to limit international student recruitment efforts.

The letter, discussing the "termination of active recruitment of international students", highlighted the importance of international students but cited pressure on teaching staff, facilities and accommodation shortages as overwhelming reasons for the request.



Supreme Court case

We await a decision on the case against Harvard and UNC Chapel Hill which could radically (and immediately) change the landscape of US admissions:

- Banning the use of race in admissions
- Changes to how legacy can be used
- Restricting / banning Early Decision
- Roles of how institutional priorities can work within institutions.

Predictions of how this will impact things range from the cataclysmic to a mild shrug – it all depends on the exact ruling. But, with a conservative majority on the Supreme Court, some change seems likely.

IPEDS data

A change in the way the US Department of Education requests data has had some unintended consequences. By no-longer allowing universities to count incomplete applications in their data, many US colleges may see the a decline in the number of "applications" to their university – and thus a rise in the admissions rate.


As a result, many colleges are chasing students who have added a college to the Common App – which universities can see as – without actually going on to submit an application

NCAA & Testing

"The Council voted to eliminate test score requirements for immediate eligibility for incoming freshman student-athletes, at the recommendation from the NCAA Standardized Test Score Task Force. The task force was a specialized group charged with reviewing initial eligibility requirements as part of the NCAA's eight-point plan to advance racial equity.

"As some NCAA member schools shift away from requiring standardized test scores for general student admissions, the Council felt it was appropriate to reflect those admission standards in eligibility requirements for incoming freshman student-athletes," Tealer said.

Since 2020, NCAA Division I has waived standardized test requirements due to the COVID-19 pandemic and its impact on the ability of prospects to take the test."

Fears stoked by certain media outlets about admissions to certain UK universities from certain UK schools


This all leads to massive student anxiety
