All organisations that work with children and families have a shared responsibility to safeguard children and to work together to do this. On the Island the


Isle of Wight Council, Hampshire and Isle of Wight Integrated Care Board, and Hampshire and Isle of Wight Police work together as Safeguarding Partners to protect children on the Island in a formal arrangement called the Isle of Wight Safeguarding Children Partnership.

Safeguarding children is everyone's responsibility and the Partnership's ambition is that everyone can recognise and respond to ensure that children, young people and their families are effectively safeguarded and supported.

### Partnership Board meeting - Tuesday 28th January 2025 - Key headlines

The Partnership received a presentation on the Isle of Wight Poverty Reduction Strategy. It has been developed to enable different groups to collectively address the issues around poverty. Members noted a strong reference to children and their families within the strategy and how it links to the Isle of Wight Council's housing strategy, which is in development, and the draft education strategy. Members noted the impact on children when they lack suitable and stable accommodation, and the Council's responsibility to care leavers and as corporate parents.

Members were given an update on the develop of the Isle of Wight Multi-Agency Safeguarding Hub which went live on the 24th February 2025. Hampshire continue to provide the out of hours service until the 31st March 2026. The threshold indicators chart has not changed. See page 2.



Ashley Whittaker, Strategic Director of Children's Services, shared with members the outcome of the Ofsted focussed visit in November 2024 which examined 'The experience and progress of children who need help and protection', an area identified for improvement in the November 2023 Ofsted inspection. The visit's outcome was positive. Inspectors concluded that most children with child protection plans are now having their needs better met and are safer. The report also noted that many of the weaknesses identified in the 2023 inspection have been effectively addressed.



'Keeping Children Safe, Helping Families Thrive' is a UK government policy statement that outlines the government's commitment to reform the children's social care system. Debbie Key, Strategic Partnership Manager for the IOWSCP, presented the key points:

- Keeping families together: Emphasising support to keep children safe within their family settings whenever possible.
- Alternative care: Supporting children who cannot stay at home to live in family settings like kinship or foster care, rather than residential care.
- Fixing the care market: Addressing issues in the care market to ensure it works effectively for vulnerable children and families.
- Legislative proposals: Introducing new laws to support these goals when parliamentary time allows.

Partnership Manager, Kelly Diamond, presented the quarter 1 and quarter 2 2024-25 partnership data report which was analysed by the Performance and Quality Assurance subgroup [PQA] and the Executive groups. The Partnership uses quarterly information from agencies to develop a holistic picture of the child protection system on the Isle of Wight. The analysis is aligned to the IOWSCP business plan priorities and has, in addition, core data to monitor progress in other safeguarding and child protection work. Some of the items noted from the report included:

- The number of safeguarding children referrals made to CRT MASH by the National Probation Service (NPS) has significantly increased over quarter 1 and 2. This was an area of focus for the NPS following their last inspection.
- The percentage of care leavers aged 18+ who were children looked after at 16 who were in employment, education or training continues to decrease.
- The percentage of Review Child Protection Conferences (RCPCs) held in time has been consistently 100% or 99.1% since Q4 2023-24.
- The number of families with children living in B&Bs continues to rise.
- Members discussed the number of children on the Island with a parent in prison, noting it's relevance to ACES, and how the needs of children and families can be supported.

In October, the Partnership undertook a Joint Targeted Area Inspection (JTAI) 'dry run' audit. It focussed on the theme of 'Early Help' and considered the multi-agency response to children and families who need help. This dry run audit provides an opportunity to evidence the strong partnership working already in place on the Island and to rehearse the Partnership's responses to a JTAI. A multi-agency audit panel, together with frontline practitioners, discussed a selection of children and families who have received early help support. A number of areas of strengths and good practice were identified, including the tenacity and willingness of our frontline practitioners and noting individual practitioners' work with families, that was often seen to be effective and supportive of the family's needs. There was positive feedback during the audit from frontline practitioners about the early help team. Recommendations have been developed in order to address areas to strengthen practice; these will be monitored by the PQA subgroup. A practitioner briefing is being developed to share learning from the audit with agencies and frontline practitioners.

Kay Jones, Service Director for Children's Social Care, informed members of the **Young Inspectors Scheme**. This national scheme gives children a platform to share their views and help develop services and activities. They participate by completing a child-friendly questionnaire, observing,

and recording their opinions. After each visit, a report is written with recommendations on how to improve the environment and services to make them more accessible and engaging. The young inspectors come from diverse backgrounds, lived experiences, and schools. Last year, 70 pieces of feedback were provided by young inspectors on the Isle of Wight.



## Multi-Agency Safeguarding Hub (MASH) arrangements on the Isle of Wight

As you may be aware, since the 24th February 2025 the Isle of Wight Council took over providing the Multi Agency Safeguarding Hub [MASH] service on the island for Isle of Wight children and families.

Professionals should complete an Inter-Agency Referral Form (IARF) when making a referral to Children's Services. The IARF can now be found on the <u>Isle of Wight Council's website</u>, and the <u>Isle of Wight Safeguarding Children Partnership website</u>. A new professional's telephone line and number in place [see below].

Before professionals complete an Inter-Agency Referral Form (IARF) the <u>Threshold Chart</u> should be reviewed in reference to the child/young person and their individual circumstances. **Please note the Threshold Chart has not changed.** 

If you have any queries or questions relating to a referral, threshold application or the outcome decision, please contact the MASH team directly [details below].

There will be **no change** to the delivery of the **out of hours service**. The Isle of Wight Children's Services out of hours service will continue to be delivered by Hampshire County Council, via a service level agreement.

## HIPS Child Sexual Abuse Response Pathway Launch: Tuesday 1st April 2025

In collaboration with the Centre for Expertise on Child Sexual Abuse, the Hampshire, Isle of Wight, Portsmouth and Southampton Safeguarding Children Partnerships are pleased to announce the HIPS Child Sexual Abuse Response Pathway. This was launched on the 1st April 2025.

#### Why is this important?

One in ten children in England and Wales will experience some form of child sexual abuse before the age of 16, yet most of this abuse is currently not identified or responded to. While surveys indicate that sexual abuse is as common as other forms of childhood abuse, it is much less likely to be identified by professionals.

Those working with children need a clear understanding of the specific actions and processes they should follow when they have concerns of child sexual abuse. To support professionals in this, the Centre for Expertise on Child Sexual Abuse (CSA Centre) has created the Child Sexual Abuse Response Pathway (Response Pathway), an interactive online resource to guide professionals through how they can protect and support children and their families when there are concerns of sexual abuse. This is now part of the HIPS Child Sexual Abuse toolkit.

#### What is the Child Sexual Abuse Response Pathway?

It is an interactive online resource designed for professionals working with children, to help them understand the steps they can take to protect and support young people and their families. It sets

out how to respond to concerns that a child may be being sexually abused at key points: from first concerns and early help safeguarding through to child protection and criminal justice responses. Throughout, the Response Pathway focuses on meeting the needs of children and their families.

## Independent Sexual Violence Advisers [ISVAs] on the Isle of Wight

Experiencing sexual violence and abuse is a traumatic experience and survivors often feel isolated and overwhelmed, not knowing what to do next. Hampton Trust work with clients who have experienced sexual violence and abuse, providing support and guidance that is specifically tailored to each client's needs. The service is provided irrespective of whether the sexual abuse occurred recently, a long time ago, or through domestic sexual abuse. They also work with children and young people.

**Independent Sexual Violence Advisers (ISVAs)** offer independent advice and support to help survivors make informed choices about what happens next, irrespective of whether they are reporting to the police and would like support to navigate the criminal justice system or whether they have chosen not to report.

The ISVAs ensure survivors have a safe space to consider their options and feel supported to make decisions that feel right for them. If applicable, ISVAs help survivors navigate their criminal justice journey, ensuring they are supported every step of the way.

The aim as an ISVA is to empower survivors by rebuilding self-confidence and self-worth, offering them choices where they feel they have no voice, and enabling survivors to gain back control over their own lives and futures.

## Neglect Safeguarding Practice Week - Neglect strategy and toolkit

Persistent neglect remains the most common form of harm experienced by children both locally and nationally. Recognising that neglect can have a long-lasting, serious impact on a child's development, health, education and overall quality of life is crucial. Early identification and intervention are key to preventing neglect, supporting families, and ensuring children's safety and wellbeing.

To continue raising awareness of neglect and the resources available to practitioners, the Isle of Wight Safeguarding Children Partnership [IOWSCP] and Hampshire Safeguarding Children Partnership [HSCP] jointly held a **Neglect Safeguarding Practice**Week on the 17th—21st March to raise awareness of neglect and the range of tools available for all practitioners.

Throughout the week, various aspects of multi-agency practice were explored each day and a live tour of the IOWSCP and HSCP Neglect Toolkit [see below] was held.



## Working together to resolve professional differences [escalation and resolution]

Multi-agency working will sometimes give rise to differences of opinion or concerns about safeguarding practice in relation to a child and/or family member. Practitioners may have differing views of what the right approach to safeguarding and promoting the wellbeing of a child should be. It may also be the case that occasionally the needs of some children and families do not easily translate into the application of threshold criteria.

However, throughout our work the child is always our shared primary concern and professional disagreements must not get in the way of this. If you feel that a practitioner is not acting in the best interests of a child you have a responsibility to respectfully challenge the practitioner and if resolution cannot be achieved, to escalate your concern.


The new Working Together to Resolve Professional Differences (Escalation and Resolution) procedure and guidance is for use across the HIPS area [Hampshire, IOW, Portsmouth and Southampton].

This new procedure replaces the previous protocol for the Escalation and Resolution of Professional Disagreement.

This is an important procedure for everyone who works with children and families and starts from a premise that professional challenge and curiosity are welcomed and necessary to ensure children are effectively safeguarded and their wellbeing is promoted.

Alongside the new HIPS guidance, our latest **STOP Pack** provides resources supporting practitioners to navigate professional differences, equipping them with the new HIPS procedures, essential toolkits, strategies, threshold charts, tools, and additional resources to enhance practice in this area.

## **IOW Suicide Prevention and Postvention Protocol for Schools and Colleges**

When someone dies by suspected suicide it can come as a sudden shock and sadness for those who knew them. It can be hard to navigate what steps your setting should be taking and what support is available for staff, students and the wider community.

The Isle of Wight Suicide prevention and postvention protocol for education settings is intended for use by Isle of Wight schools and colleges following the suspected suicide of a staff or school member. It provides a framework for school leaders to follow through.

## Child Exploitation Risk Assessment Framework [CERAF] update

The CERAF is a tool to aid practitioners in assessing harm outside the home for children and young people. It supports identification of risk areas to be addressed and outlines next steps. The CERAF is used across the whole of Hampshire and the Isle of Wight.

A CERAF should be completed as soon as potential concerns regarding any form of child exploitation are identified. This may include Child Sexual Exploitation (CSE), Child Criminal Exploitation (CCE), County Lines (CL), Modern Day Slavery (MDS) or Child Trafficking concerns. Concerns may arise from information following a missing episode, increased instances of a child missing from school, staying out late, or associating with new peers/associates where there may be concerns or known intelligence of risk.

A CERAF should be completed when a school is considering exclusion.

Where possible a CERAF should accompany the referral to Children Services/Multi-Agency Safeguarding Hub [MASH] to enable information to be assessed against information held by partner agencies.

The CERAF and accompanying guidance has recently been reviewed and updated.

# Disrupting Grooming Gangs and Ending Child Sexual Abuse and Exploitation through a 'Whole-System' Approach

In the wake of extensive media coverage on 'grooming gangs' and the simultaneous spreading of a great deal of misinformation, the Home Secretary recently ordered a national audit of gang-related child sexual exploitation, to examine the true current scale and nature of the problem. Child sexual abuse and exploitation (CSAE) is, however, a deeply complex issue and as outlined by the *Independent Inquiry into Child Sexual Abuse (IICSA)* report's key recommendations. It requires a 'whole-system' approach with better multi-agency collaboration to identify and disrupt it, with a particular need for better information-sharing between key agencies.
