Partnership Board meeting held on the 29th March 2022 – Key Information

- Hampshire Constabulary presented their Action Plan following the outcome of the HMICFRS's inspection in June 2021.
- Children's Social Care provided an update to members on Unaccompanied Asylum-Seeking Children (UASC) looked after by the Isle of Wight. Members also discussed the process in place for Ukrainian families arriving in the UK and on the Island. A partnership response is in place which CSC are leading from a safeguarding checks perspective
- Marcia Tanyanyiwa, Junior/Primary Schools Cyber Ambassador Coordinator for the Office of the Police Crime Commissioner joined the meeting alongside 3 Cyber Ambassadors from The Bay School. Marcia presented the results of the Parent/Carer Cyber Safety survey which explored how well parents/carers can currently support their child or young person with any online safety concerns. 245 responses for the IOW were received. 67% agreed or strongly agreed with the statement that they wanted to improve their understanding of online safety and what to do if they come across problems online. 60% agreed or strongly agreed with the statement that they would like to improve their approach when speaking about online safety at home. The Apps they would like to learn more about, and particular online safety topics were collected and importantly how families would like to learn about these e.g. attend online sessions, watch videos, attend in person sessions. Results from the survey will be used to create (and sign post to) resources to help parents/carers support their children and shape the learning and digital skills children and young people are equipped with as part of the Cyber Ambassador scheme. The children presented on what online safety means to them and their friends, what trusted adults can do to help them stay safe online, and what they have done in their roles as cyber ambassadors to support peers online.
- Jenny Burn presented a paper on school exclusions and the data around children with vulnerabilities This paper will be used to inform the IOWSCP Business Plan Priority for 2022-23 on non-attendance of children at school.
- The Education Self-Assessment Audit Report for 2021 was presented. The Audit requires governing bodies to carry out an annual review of their safeguarding practice. As with previous years, all Island schools returned their self-assessments. Each school is required to develop an action plan to address any gaps and to improve areas identified for development through the audit. The report will be analysed by the IOWSCP Education Subgroup.
- Partner Agencies were presented with a Data Sharing Agreement which covers the sharing of information between the signatory Partner Organisation and the Isle of Wight Council, who are acting as host controller for the IOWSCP. It details the specific purposes for sharing information and the personal information being shared, the required operational procedures, consent processes, and the legal justification that underpins the disclosure/exchange of information. It is a key protocol, and each Partner Agency is required to sign the agreement, although it is not applicable for schools. Agencies were asked to complete the Agreement.
- The annual review of the Partnership Board and Business Group Terms of Reference (TOR) were completed prior to the meeting and updated TOR were presented to members. The Business Group has been re-named the 'Executive Group. It's role is to ensure statutory functions are met and to drive the Business Plan forward. The Partnership Board acts as the critical friend. Understand the purpose of Missing Conversations and how these help inform planning. It will cover the role of push and pull factors and highlight some of the risks which can be associated with missing episodes. It will include reflection on professional considerations for practice and provide details of Local Authority points of contact in relation to missing children.</p>
