that you will be close to them and protect them.


We pray for world leaders, for compassion, strength and wisdom to guide their choices.

Glasgow has a new Archbishop! The Holy Father h as appointed Bishop William Nolan as Archbishop of Glasgow.

The Archbishop of Glasgow was installed as successor of St Mungo in St Andrew's Cathedral, February 26th, 2022.

Reacting to his appointment, the Archbishop said: "I feel overwhelmed by the trust Pope Francis is putting in me by appointing me as Archbishop of Glasgow. It will be a wrench for me to leave Galloway Diocese where for seven years I have experienced the kindness and friendship of so many people, particularly the clergy. "As I overcome my initial shock at being appointed Archbishop my thoughts now turn to the challenges that lies ahead. I look forward to working with everyone in the Archdiocese, laity and clergy, to carry out the mission that we share of proclaiming God's good news and of bringing the joy of the gospel into the lives of the people of today."As I leave the Diocese of Galloway behind, from now on "I belong to Glasgow." And I assure the people of Glasgow of my commitment and dedication to them. Please remember me in your prayers."

"It's time to rediscover the joy of the Gospel" ... that was the most powerful message of Glasgow's new Archbishop in his first homily as successor of St Mungo. "We have lost our enthusiasm for the good news, and yet that's the whole purpose of the Church's existence. The Church exists to preach the good news!"

In a brave rallying call, which seemed to echo the message of Pope Francis' landmark exhortation The Joy of the Gospel (Evangelii Gaudium) the new Archbishop called for an era of fresh enthusiasm from all in the Church and in wider society. "We seem to have lost joy in our own hearts, and in the world in which we live so many people don't see the Catholic Church as a source of joy, but rather as something that's going to weight them down and impose burdens on them ... yet Jesus tells us that he had come so that we might have life and have it to the full!"

He issued a rallying cry to priests to rediscover the joy and enthusiasm of their ordination day and he urged lay people to trust in the Holy Spirit to revive the flame of faith in the hearts of those who no longer practise the faith.

The full text of the Archbishop's homily: here

We offer our sincere congratulations to His Grace and pray that he flourishes in our city of Glasgow

The Sacred Triduum

One single celebration of our Passover from death to life.

Day 1 Holy Thursday "Do this in remembrance of me".

That Holy Thurssday celebration of the Eucharist and the birth of the priesthood is instituted and remembered each Holy Thursday at the Chrism Mass when Bishops invite their priests to renew their priestly promise as they did on the day of their ordination. As part of our objectives, as Serrans we must appreciate very strongly that event and support priests in their sacred ministry through continual prayer for the perseverance of their vocations.

On the anniversary of that day when Christ our Lord conferred his priesthood on his Apostles our Bishops ask of them and on us, "Are you resolved to renew in the presence of your Bishop and God's holy people, the promises you once made?" To which they respond "I am"

Are you resolved to be more united with the Lord Jesus and more closely conformed to him, denying yourselves and confirming those promises about sacred duties towards Christ and His Church which, prompted by love of him, you willingly and joyfully pledged on the day of your priestly ordination? To which they respond "I am"

Are you resolved to be faithful stewards of the mysteries of God in the Holy Eucharist and the other liturgical rites and to discharge faithfully the sacred office of teaching, following Christ the Head and Shepherd, not seeking any gain, but moved only by zeal for souls? Priests respond "I am"

Turning towards the people, the Bishop continues: As for you, dearest sons and daughters, pray for your Priests, that the Lord may pour out his gifts abundantly upon them and keep them faithful as ministers of Christ, the High Priest, so that they may lead you to him, who is the source of salvation.

At the last supper Jesus said "This is my body which will be given up for you" He is then captured, lead off to be judged, scorned and finally crucified giving His life for our redemption from sin and that is what we celebrate on Good Friday. Having received communion for the last time on Holy Thursday before Our Lord's death, the Blessed Sacrament is taken to a place of repose and the altar stripped bare, candles and all liturgical aids removed.

Day 2 Good Friday "He did It, He gave up His life for us."

A simple cross is processed into the church which we venerate as the cross of life and victory. There is no celebration of the Eucharist there is no mass. The Good Friday liturgy is austere and yet filled with hope. Our celebrants wear the red vestments of martyrdom honouring our Lord's death and the victory which gives meaning to all martyrdom. We venerate the wooden cross with a kiss. There is the opportunity to receive the Eucharist consecrated on last night. The Eucharist is taken with no ceremony from the altar

of repose and receiving the Eucharist it is returned to the altar of repose again with no ceremony. At the end of this event we walk away from Calvary. We leave the church in total silence, austere with the enthroned naked cross of wood behind us. The altar is stripped bare the tabernacle doors thrown open, the deed has been completed. *Our Lord has been crucified*.

Day 3 Holy Saturday and Easter vigil "Our Lord is not there"

There are the quiet footsteps of the faithful arriving for morning prayer with the anticipation of the coming event, coming to clean the church, prepare the altar, the paschal candle and sanctuary. The paschal candle is prepared with the year date and the Greek letters Alpha and Omega symbolizing Christ as the beginning and the end. Water is prepared for the blessing which will be used throughout the coming year. The expectation of this magnificent event, the most important celebration of our faith increases.

The Easter Vigil.

"Christ has died.... Christ is risen"



Without the resurrection we have no faith, no Christianity, no Catholic Church. This is the "Passover of Our Lord" from death to new life. The church is in total darkness as we stand at the rear of the church at dusk awaiting a light to the paschal candle from a raging bonfire. As we enter the church the bonfire is no longer required as the candle comes into its own rite

spreading the light of Christ to the congregation following in procession lead by our deacon or priest. The Paschal candle held high leads the procession to the chant "Lumen Christi" the light of Christ".

The (Exsultet) proclaiming this is the night when Jesus rose from the dead demands to be sung as it has been for over eighteen hundred years. The church then arises in full light as we listen to the readings recalling God's intervention throughout history to save his people.

The celebration of Mass starts with The Gloria sung to a ringing of bells heralding the Risen Christ. The liturgy of Baptism continues with the central theme of sharing in Christ's Passover from death to new life. New candidates are received into our Church to the Litany of the Saints. In a prayer stretching back to the early Church, God's blessing and the power of the Holy Spirit is called upon the waters. The blessing of the baptismal water is completed by the immersion of the paschal candle into the water three times. The new candidates are now part of the Church. We renew our baptismal promises as God's chosen people. The Liturgy of the Eucharist. The theme is Christ's paschal mystery: we now share as a community in that same Passover. Gathered as His body, the Church makes Christ present, alive and active to continue the work of redemption here and now. The light has spread as far as it can inside the church. It is now time for us, enlightened and refreshed, to make Christ's presence known and felt throughout the world.

"Christ is risen. Alleluia Alleluia!"

A new springtime of vocations? Following the call of the Lord

With three new ordinations due this summer, a record number of students studying for the priesthood and the appointment of a new Archbishop, 2022 is set be a year of hope and growth for the Archdiocese.



Father Ross Campbell, vocations director, and chaplain to Glasgow Serra who is based at Turnbull Hall at Glasgow University said: "We currently have eight men in formation, which is the most we have had for quite some time and as a diocese we look forward to three priestly ordinations this summer."

Continuing he said "It is also encouraging to note that our monthly discernment evenings only began in January and yet we have six men signed up for them already. These evenings offer the opportunity for men thinking about the priesthood to come and find out a little bit more about what life as a diocesan priest is like. We meet monthly for catechesis, prayer and fraternity and I would encourage those interested to get in touch to find out more."

He added: "While there can be in little doubt that the pandemic has led to a shrinking of the Church in Scotland, it is encouraging to see that some have been able to deepen their faith in these difficult times of restrictions and lockdowns. God never stops calling, and despite the challenges we face in the years to come, it is a consolation to see that some men continue to respond generously to this call.

Matthew, Mark, Luke and John the evangelists.

This is the fourth article on our evangelists. In The Feb issue we looked at St Luke appropriately as this is the year of Luke in our liturgical calendar. However at the Easter time our gospels are dedicated to St John

St John



St John the Evangelist is the name traditionally given to the author of the Gospel of John. St. John the Evangelist, the Beloved Disciple, was the youngest of the Apostles and the third to be admitted to Jesus's privileged inner circle, He, James the Greater,, (John's elder brother, the Zebadees) and Peter were suffered to remain with Jesus when all the rest of the apostles were kept at a distance [Mark 5:37, Matthew 17:1, 26:37]. Peter, James, and John were with

Christ in the Garden of Gethsemane. John was one of the three Apostles along with his brother, James, and Peter privileged to witness Jesus's Transfiguration on Mt. Tabor (Matthew 17:1–6). . John was the one who raced to the tomb after hearing that Mary Magdalene discovered it empty. Out of respect for Peter's position as the leader of the Apostles, John waited outside the tomb until Peter entered (John 20:1–9). Before our Saviour died, he entrusted his mother, the Virgin Mary, to the care of John, the Beloved Disciple (John 19:27). Tradition holds that she lived with John in Ephesus until her Assumption in Jerusalem

Because John was the youngest of the 12 Apostles, he is often depicted in sacred art as beardless, unlike the other 11. This is why, in Leonardo da Vinci's painting of the Last Supper, John, seated to Jesus's right, looks very young. John is also the only Apostle who wasn't martyred. He lived into his 90s and died of natural causes (around 100AD), probably in Ephesus in present-day Turkey.

St John wrote the fourth Gospel and the three Letters of St. John. In his letters, he addresses the Christian community as catholic, meaning "for all." and is also known as John the Divine for his lofty theology.

His symbol as an evangelist is an eagle. Because of the inspired visions of the book of Revelation, the Byzantine churches entitled him "the Theologian"; the title appears in Byzantine manuscripts of Revelation but not in manuscripts of the Gospel.

John's gospel differs in character from the synoptic gospels (Matthew, Mark, and Luke) in significant ways. John probably intends to supplement and reframe what others have

already taught about Jesus Christ. We do not know if John was familiar with the synoptic gospels themselves, but he seems to presume that his audience has a basic familiarity with the life, teachings, death, and resurrection of Jesus. For example, instead of hearing about Jesus' baptism directly, we hear the words of John the Baptist before and after the baptism. In John's account of the Last Supper, there is no mention of Jesus instituting the Eucharist. Instead, Jesus washes the disciples' feet and then explains the importance of service to one another in a 3-chapter discourse. However, it seems likely John intends for his audience to connect the meaning of Eucharist to the foot washing (13:1-20), the Last Supper Discourse (14:1 – 16:33), and the Bread of Life Discourse earlier in the gospel (6:22-69).

Whereas the other three gospels share many of the same brief stories in a few verses, John's are longer and more complex. Therefore, when short passages from the Gospel of John are proclaimed at Mass – especially when chapters 3, 10, 14-16, and 17 are each read over a series of days during the weekdays of the Easter season and when chapter 6 is read over 5 consecutive Sundays in the summer of Year B – someone desiring a deeper connection to sacred Scripture may consider reading the entire chapter/discourse in one sitting.

John's frequent dramatic irony illustrates Jesus' teachings and actions by presenting characters with different levels of understanding. At the wedding in Cana, the servers and Jesus' mother know what Jesus has done, but the headwaiter and the bridegroom do not (2:1-11). The man born blind comes to recognize Jesus as "Lord," but some of the Pharisees refuse to see Jesus' true identity (9:1-41).

In John, Jesus often speaks in a repetitious, poetic form of prose which circles back to the same concept multiple times, adding shades of nuances in each repetition. This may be most apparent in the Bread of Life Discourse (6:26-59) and the Priestly Prayer (17:1-26):

"I am the bread of life; whoever comes to me will never hunger.... I am the living bread that came down from heaven; whoever eats this bread will live forever" (6:35, 51)

"I pray... that they may all be one, as you, Father, are in me and I in you.... I have given them the glory you gave me, so that they may be one, I in them and you in me.... The love with which you loved me may be in them and I in them." (17:20-23, 26)

John's gospel is filled with symbolism. It has been said that "John writes like Picasso paints." We may wonder why John mentions that Peter denies Jesus while warming himself at a charcoal fire (18:18), until when, after the Resurrection, Peter shares a meal prepared by Jesus at another charcoal fire (21:9). Scriptures scholars often debate the significance of John's symbolic representations. For example, many Biblical scholars believed that the location of John's story of the healing of a paralyzed man (5:2-9) – a pool near the Sheep

Gate with five porticos – was a symbolic choice, until a late 19th-century archaeological excavation uncovered a 2000-year-old pool near the Sheep Gate, with five porticos!

Perhaps the most striking difference between John and the other gospels is its Christology – its theology of the person, the nature, and the role of Jesus as the Christ. While John includes a few details that indicate Jesus' human nature (1:45-46, 2:4-5, 2:25), John emphasizes Jesus' divine nature as the Christ of God much more explicitly than the synoptic gospels. It seems likely that John is countering a first-century heresy that claimed Jesus was merely a human being, without a divine nature.

From the first sentence of his magnificent prologue, John presents Jesus as the bringer of the new creation: "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God." As God's very Word (Greek: logos), Christ was present at the creation of the universe when the Father said, "Let there be light." Perhaps Pilate's declaration, "Behold, the man!" in 19:5 is an echo of the creation of the first humans in Genesis 1:26. John also emphasizes that Jesus' resurrection happens "on the first day of the week," the same day on which God first created the world (20:1).

Throughout John's gospel, Jesus repeatedly uses the words "I am" in an explicit reference to God's sacred name revealed to Moses at the burning bush (Exodus 3:14).

"I am the bread of life." (6:35)

"I am the light of the world." (8:12)

"I am the gate." (10:9)

"I am the good shepherd." (10:11)

"I am the resurrection and the life." (11:25)

"I am the way and the truth and the life." (14:6)

"I am the vine." (15:5)

When the soldiers and guards come to arrest Jesus, he says "I AM," they turn around and fall to the ground. (18:5-6)

More than the other gospels, John presents Jesus as in control of the destiny the Father desires for him. Whereas Matthew, Mark, and Luke present Jesus praying in agony in the Garden of Gethsemane before his arrest, John provides Jesus' long, intimate prayer to the Father on that same evening (17:1-26). In his trial, Jesus remains in the praetorium, while Pilate scuttles inside and outside, bowing to the pressure of the religious authorities to put Jesus to death. When Jesus is sentenced to crucifixion, it is Jesus, not Pilate, who is seated on the judge's bench, dressed in a purple cloak (19:1-16).

Prayer to St. John

O God, who through the blessed Apostle John have unlocked for us the secrets of your Word, grant, we pray, that we may grasp with proper understanding what he has so marvelously brought to our ears. 
