The Priests' Day Devotion was founded by Father Paschal in the 1920's of THE SALVATORIAN FATHERS, now at ABBOTS LANGLEY, WATFORD, HERTS.

Father Paschal was an outstandingly zealous priest, who taught in one of the Salvatorian Junior Seminaries in the 1920's. He saw and realised the essential need of obtaining spiritual and material help for the students during the long years of training for the priesthood.

During his retreat in 1930 he first thought of the idea that every Catholic should be encouraged to help towards the education of poor students to the priesthood and to adopt them in their prayers.

In 1931 he discussed this matter with the Bishop of Berlin, who in turn spoke to the Princess of Saxony about it. Father Paschal met the Princess in 1933 and she suggested dedicating one day each month to prayers for priests and vocations.

Whilst praying in the Basilica of St. Paul in Rome in 1934, the good priest first thought of the idea of a Votive Mass in honour of Christ, the Eternal High Priest. He wrote out his ideas for presentation to the Holy Father. On November

21st, 1934, Pope Pius XI welcomed the plan saying "We heartily praise and bless the work. We repeat !"The plan pleases us, We praise and bless it heartily." In 1935 he

authorised a new votive Mass of "Jesus Christ the Eternal High Preist." From that time onwards, millions of leaflets

explaining the Priests' Day Devotion have been distributed throughout the world with the blessing and warmest approval of many bishops and priests.

The Priests' Day Devotion This consists in setting aside one day each month, usually the first Thursday or the first Saturday, for prayers and sacrifices for holy priests and vocations. Holy Mass and for this intention.

Communion are offered for this intention. Sickness, sorrow, infirmity and happiness can all be turned into a prayer and offered to God, through Our Blessed Lady,

Throughout the Serra world we have our 31 club which was founded by Serra in Australia similar to the Priests'Day Devotion when we ask parishioners to choose a day each month when he or she would offer their mass for the priests, sisters, brothers, deacons and lay ministers and that future church vocations will be forthcoming from their community.

The history of the Priests' Day Devotion finishes with a simple reflection "What is a priest?" and a "Prayer for priests."

What is a Priest?

He is "a man taken from amongst men."

He could be your brother, the boy next door, the man over the way. Like you he can smile and laugh, eat and sleep, be happy or sad. When he becomes a Priest, God gives him very special work.

He entrusts him with our souls that are going to live forever.

He will baptize; Teach us about God and our Faith.



He will offer Holy Mass and give us Our Lord in Holy communion.

He will free us from our sins in Confession. He will Bless the young couple on their wedding day. He will visit the sick and help us to live and die as God's friends.

He will go on praying for us long after we are dead. He is always there to help, advise, guard and guide.

God gives no greater vocation to any man. He gives it to very few. We can all share it by our prayers and sacrifices for holy priests and vocations.

Our friend Sr Joachim of the Missionaries of Charity was asked to write a letter for publication in Fides, the Vatican's magazine for Catholic missionaries. We thought you might be interested in reading it as it exemplifies beautifully the work that she and her volunteers undertake.

Dear Friends

We have just had a wonderful experience of the care and concern of the Church, through the short visit of the Nuncio here in Ethiopia.

We live on the 'frontiers of the Gospel' in Gode, a place where the vast majority of the population are Muslim; there is a small presence of Orthodox and Evangelical communities, and a tiny presence of the Church in our mission of seven missionary Catholics, three of whom are volunteers.

Normally the Prefect of the local Church visits us every two weeks to celebrate Holy Mass and help us in our mission of making Christ present both through our work with vulnerable women and their children, and the work of transforming our desert through growing fruit and vegetables to make us more self-sustaining. For various reasons, Fr Angelo, had to be absent, a priest who had kindly offered to come for a few days had a death in the family, and without any replacement we ended up having no Mass for more than a month, and the Eucharist which was reserved in our tabernacle could only be broken into so many pieces.....


The nuncio's visit was a joy for all of us and coincided with the rain which we had hoped would fall since mid-October, we were well into the rainy season and had had very little till this point in time. So we received both natural rain and supernatural grace at the same time: Holy Mass, homilies on the Word of God, and the possibility of confession. We enjoyed hearing from the nuncio of the life of the Church in different places, to be refreshed with the news of the latest Apostolic Letter of the Holy Father on St Therese of Lisieux



Although the visit was only two days, the visit of the nuncio, broke our sense of isolation and helped us to feel part of the Universal Church again. We are grateful that the nuncio braved the plague of grasshoppers who arrived in the wake of the rains, and though his visit was short we are so very grateful.

Once the nuncio had left, we returned to some of the practical challenges that were brought on by the welcomed rainfall. It is usual that when rain falls heavily, as it did for a few days, the local electricity from the town cuts out, and whilst we have a generator, the high cost of petrol means that we have to be careful, and anyway it can't substitute all our electrical needs, one of which is to be able to pump water for our needs and to be able to pump 20,000 litres of water a day for our neighbours in the prison.

Of course, in a place like Gode, electricians are few and far between, and so the simple task of calling an electrician to fix the problems caused by the electrical 'outage' was a challenge in itself; finding out what the exact problem was, another and then discovering the way to fix it yet another! Every missionary knows the functioning or malfunctioning of



the structures of the mission can be so challenging and downright depressing as you see all the resources of the mission being absorbed in repairs and unforeseen costs, that it is easy to lose sight of the mission itself, and so the visit of the nuncio was a great help

keeping our minds and hearts fixed on the mission which, as Pope Francis reminded us in his Mission Sunday Message, "the Lord is greater than all our problems, above all if we encounter them in our mission of proclaiming the Gospel to the world. For in the end, this mission is his…" This was also brought home to us by the response to our litany of lamentations to our Prefect, Fr Angelo, the simple sentence, "Jesus is risen!"

Holy Father's 60th World Day of Prayer for "Vocation: Grace and Mission

The Holy father tells us "Within the Church, all of us are servants, in accordance with the variety of our vocations, charisms and ministries. Our common vocation to give ourselves in love develops and finds concrete expression in the life of lay men and women, devoted to raising a family as a small *domestic church* and working as a leaven of the Gospel to renew the different sectors of society; in the testimony of consecrated women and men who are completely committed to God for the sake of their brothers and sisters as a prophetic sign of the kingdom of God; in ordained ministers – deacons, priests and bishops – placed at the service of preaching, prayer and fostering the communion of the holy People of God. Only in relation with all the others does any vocation in the Church fully disclose its true nature and richness.

The Holy father offers the prayer that Saint Paul VI composed for the first World Day of Vocations, 11 April 1964

"O Jesus, divine Shepherd of souls, you called the apostles and made them fishers of men. Continue to draw to yourself ardent and generous souls from among the young, in order to make them your followers and your ministers. Give them a share in your thirst for the redemption of all... Open before them the horizons of the entire world... By responding to your call, may they prolong your mission here on earth, build up your Mystical Body which is the Church, and be 'the salt of the earth' and 'the light of the world'.
