Pope St John Paul thoughts on Christmas

The Christmas tree:

The message of the christmas tree is consequently that life stays 'evergreen' if we make a gift of it: not so much of material things, but of life itself in friendship and sincere affection, in fraternal help and forgiveness, in time shared and reciprocal listening.

The Nativity scene:

Small or large, simple or elaborate, it is a familiar and most vivid representation of Christmas. The Nativity scene is a feature of our culture and art, but above all it is a sign of faith in God, who in Bethlehem came 'and dwelt among us.'

The Christmas wafer:

A polish tradition. The Christmas wafer is exactly the bread of reconciliation. God comes to man, God offers us reconciliation with himself.... And from here he arises, as it were man's first response. If God is one with us, if Christ is born in Bethlehem, then I, as a human, must be reconciled with my brother.

The empty seat at the table:

It is a beautiful custom to leave one seat free at the table, for someone who may come from the road, for a stranger. These simple gestures mean a lot. They symbolize the goodness of the human heart, which sees in another person – especially in a person in need – the presence of Christ and calls to bring a brother and sister into the atmosphere of family warmth, according to the old saying: 'Guest at home – God at home'.

The baby in a crib:

A tiny newborn child, whom the hands of a woman wrap in poor cloths and lay in a manger. this is God's sign. The centuries and the millennia pass, but the sign remains, and it remains valid for us too – the men and women of the third millennium. It is a sign of hope for the whole human family; a sign of peace for those suffering from conflicts of every kind; a sign of freedom for the poor and oppressed; a sign of mercy for those caught up in the vicious circle of sin; a sign of love and consolation for those who feel lonely and abandoned. A small and fragile sign, a humble and quiet sign, but one filled with the power of God who out of love gave us His son.

Serra, Scotus and The Immaculate Conception.

Junípero Serra was a master of the theology of John Duns Scotus, He held the prestigious position of Professor of Theology at the Lullian University in Majorca before embarking on his missionary work in the Americas. His theological expertise in Scotus' philosophical work inspired his missionary zeal, his motto "Siempre Adelante, always forward, ever onward" and his endurance, commitment to spreading Christianity in Mexico and California.

Franciscan Priest and theologian was the first to explain, coherently, the Apostolic Faith in the Immaculate Conception as something entirely coherent with Christ's universal primacy and mediation. Since his time the Magisterium of the Church has

solemnly defined this doctrine and declared it to belong to the deposit of the Faith, which Christ entrusted to His Apostles.

He was born in Duns in the Scottish Borders, in late 1265 or early 1266. His name John, the Scot from Duns. Following his education John, the 15 year-old entered the Franciscan Order in Dumfries well below the canonical age of 18.

The 8th of November is the liturgical memorial of Blessed John Duns Scotus. Pope Benedict XVI, in his apostolic letter on the occasion of the 700th anniversary of his death, given in Rome on October 28, 2008, described him as *a most learned and devout man*. John was ordained a priest at the age of 25, on March 17th, 1291. He was immediately given the faculties to hear confession, which was given to those trusted for their sound doctrine and good advice.

On 26th of March 1305 he became Regent Master of the Franciscan school at the university of Paris, where John wrote extensively on his Christocentric theology, in which the Incarnation of the Word is presented as the highest of God's works, willed from the beginning of creation, and not merely as a remedy for sin. In July of 1307 John left Paris for Cologne to reorganise the Friars as well as to confront heresy. Due to the effort he exerted on himself, he became so vulnerable to disease and died on 8th November 1308, just 43 years old.

Pope John Paul II confirmed the cult of Blessed John Duns Scotus on 20th March 1993 When referring to the teaching of the Immaculate Conception, which John defended with utmost force, This great theologian teaches us how important it is to be faithful to the Bible and the the Church. Traditionally it is said that on Christmas

night in 1281, John had a vision of the Child Jesus appearing in his arms, reflecting and firing his love for Jesus and his Blessed Mother. It needs to be said that he was famous for his defence of the doctrine of the Immaculate Conception. The observance of this feast and dogma of the Immaculate Conception began with a Papal encyclical by Pope Pius IX, on December 8, 1854. Several years later, in 1858, the Blessed Mother gave her name to St. Bernadette at Lourdes stating,

"I am the Immaculate Conception."

This dogma is a result of the central position of Christ in creation. Hence, for Christ to be the perfect mediator of redemption, he must have mediated that redemption perfectly to at least one person. Indeed Christ did, to his Mother, whom he protected from all stain of sin, even original sin, since it is more perfect to protect from sin rather than it is to free from sin after it has been contracted. This doctrine John staunchly defended in Paris in the first months of 1307.

In order to appreciate John's singular contribution on this point let us cherish what he wrote in a lecture:



Christ was the most perfect mediator. Therefore He exercised the highest degree of mediation in favour of another person. He could not be a most perfect mediator and could not repair the effects of sin to the highest degree if He did not preserve his Mother from original sin. Therefore, since He was the most perfect mediator regarding the person of His Mother, it follows that he preserved her from original sin.

ope Benedict tells us in his anniversary of the Death of

apostolic letter on the 700th anniversary of the Death of Blessed John:

After having proven with various arguments taken from theological reason, the very fact that the Blessed Virgin Mary was preserved from original sin, he was absolutely ready also to reject this conviction should it not be in harmony with the authority of the Church, saying: "We can with probability attribute to Mary all that has the greatest perfection, provided it is not opposed to the authority of the Church or the Scriptures.

Let us pray to *Doctor subtilis*, "The Subtle Doctor" Blessed John Duns Scotus:

Lord God, source of all wisdom, in Blessed John Duns Scotus, priest and champion of the Immaculate Virgin, you have given us a master of life and thought. Grant that, enlightened by his example and nourished by his doctrine, we may remain faithful followers of Christ, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, God, for ever and ever. Amen.

We must recognise two factors which hinder our work in promoting vocations to the priesthood and consecrated life. Firstly, attracting new members particularly younger committed Catholics. In many cases younger potential members who have families may find it difficult to find the time to support our apostolate. That can be difficult considering the inflated costs of just living and supporting their families which is foremost in their daily living and secondly the average age of our members. This seems to be a common factor as with other voluntary organisations in attracting younger and new people.

Having said that the enthusiasm which came across at our meeting showed a great deal of vibrancy and commitment to our work. Our members enjoy the friendship generated at the local level and gain many good vocation promotional ideas and activities at our meetings. Prayer is most important in our vocation's activities and while potential new members cannot participate at our meetings, our programmes reach out to our parishes and indeed our educational establishments. They seem to adopt that ever so necessary prayer opportunity.

The sharing of our programmes between clubs and at a national level are communicated by several methods, our website, our focus newsletter and other platforms, all useful tools to create ideas and good practices.

We shared many of our vocational programmes from parish vigils, schools and universities and even our outdoor pursuits. The objective being not only to share but encourage action by our vocation's projects throughout our country. We also shared ideas for internal club meetings activities namely to grow in faith and indeed knowledge and understanding of our faith.

Our website and Focus newsletter reach many hundreds if not thousands of God's people at home and abroad and spreading that ever so important need for prayer.

We may be small in numbers, the work we do is massive but could be improved with a few more of God's people to join our apostolate and encourage the necessary vocations to the priesthood and consecrated religious life.
