Lent, Holy week and the Paschal Mystery

During this period of Lent, in realising our own human frailties we try and put into practice the three basics functions of this lenten period. It is a time of prayer, abstinence, and almsgiving, the three pillars of Lent, when we perhaps consider those less fortunate than ourselves and of course look to our own faults and misgivings. All the penances that we do during Lent must remind us of our own faults and the need to do something to correct those faults. The 40 days of Lent should be filled with reflection, service and prayer as we journey to develop a closer relationship to God.

Holy week We absorb the retelling of the story of Jesus' journey from his tryumphal entrance to Jerusalem on that Palm Sunday and follow into Monday when Jesus clears out the temple. Tuesday, Jesus is anointed with oil at Bethany and preaches on the Mount of Olives. Wednesday, Jesus is betrayed by Judas. Thursday, Jesus celebrates the Last Supper, prays in the Garden of Gethsemane, and is arrested. Friday, Jesus is sentenced to death, scourged, beaten, crucified, and dies on the Cross. Saturday, Jesus is buried in the tomb and descends into hell We may then understand fully that greatest and most significant event of our faith, the Passion, Death, and Resurrection

on that Sunday when, Jesus rises from the dead.

The stark reality is that the resurrection entails the cross. Put simply, "no cross, no crown." Those crosses will remind us in many ways, perhaps through sickness or death of a loved one, financial worries, relationships, loss of a job, and the other trials we may have to face in our own lives. Crosses in our life serve as a reminder that only by bearing them can we really be linked to Christ, who endured that a Good Friday and his death on the cross before the magnificance of His Resurrection.

If we bear our crosses heroically with prayer, eventually they will lead to peace of mind, joy and the salvation in a new life. We must prepare for that new life.

We are reminded of this by observing the activity that takes place on Holy Saturday prior to the Easter Vigil. That Liturgy of light brings the Light of Our Lord into our lives. The Ressurection of our Lord from death to new life gives us our faith.

Holy Father's prayer intention February 2025 'For vocations to priesthood, and religious life'

Pope Francis releases his prayer intention for the month of February and urges Catholics to pray for young men and women to welcome God's call to the priesthood or religious life.

"Let us pray that the ecclesial community might welcome the desires and doubts of those young people who feel called to live Jesus's mission in life: either through the priestly life, or religious life."

Pope Francis made that appeal for prayers in The Pope Video, which was released on Tuesday to accompany his prayer intention for February 2025.

Drawing on his own vocational experience, the Pope recalled that at 17 years old he had other plans for his life that didn't include becoming a priest.

"But one day, I went into the church...and God was there, waiting for me!" he said.

The Holy Father recalled that God calls many young people to serve His people through a vocation to the priesthood or religious life.

"God still calls young people even today, sometimes in ways we can't imagine," he said. "Sometimes we don't hear because we're too busy with our own things, our own plans, even with our own things in the Church." Yet, added Pope Francis, the Holy Spirit reveals God's plan for our lives by speaking to the heart of young people.

The task of Catholics, he added, is to accompany their spiritual journey, so that they will be willing and able to welcome the call to a religious vocation.

"Let's trust young people!" concluded Pope Francis.

"And, above all, let's trust God for He calls everyone!"

The Pope Video, released depicts scenes from the early life of Jorge Mario Bergoglio, now Pope Francis, along with images from the daily lives of young people today. The effect, according to a press release, is to tie the youth of the future Pope to contemporary young people, whom God calls to a priestly or religious vocation in a similar way.

Mothering Sunday

Mother's day Sunday 30th March 2025

Mother's day will be celebrated on Sunday 30th March. Here we have the liturgical explanation for the Mothering tradition, and some suggestions to honour mothers.

It is St. Paul's words in the Mass of Laetare Sunday that gives Mothering Sunday its name. He speaks of "that Jerusalem which is above . . which is our mother," On this day, everyone paid a solemn visit to his mother church, and left an offering there at the altar.

The introit, communion and tract of the Mass speak of the heavenly Jerusalem where Christians will raise their songs of joy. Heaven, the heavenly Jerusalem, has so often been likened to and represented as a garden full of flowers, that on this day the Church used to bless the loveliest of flowers, the rose.

The word "mothering" came to have other associations; it became a feast day for the mothers of families. All the children who were away from home went back on that day to visit their mothers, taking with them a present of money, a gift, or something to eat, A mothering cake was often a special gift. Exactly what this was made of seems uncertain but was highly ornamented and adorned. In return, the mother seems to have provided for the visitors a dish of furmety, a sort of rice pudding, only made with grains of wheat instead of rice. There are relics of the observance of Mothering Sunday still left, but there is no reason why it should not be more widely noted and given as much attention as is the mother's birthday.

There are many mothers who have given their children to the priesthood and religious life and service to our church here and throughout the world.

The Annual National Vigil for Vocations May 8th -9th



Throughout Great Britain and internationally we have many vigils for vocations being held at various times throughout the year. This annual vigil which takes place around Good Shepherd Sunday, Vocations Sunday 11th May, was importantly developed to coincide with the Holy Father's message for priestly and religiou.

Traditionally our Vigil for Vocations take place in Great Britain and indeed the Serra world on the Thursday or Friday nights preceding that date giving some 48 hours of continuous prayer in parishes throughout the planet.

The Vigils, which started in Glasgow some 36 years ago were all night affairs and concluded in the early hours with morning prayer on the nearby hills overlooking our city and singing the hymn "I see the sunrise." Today I think I am a little too old for that sacrafice. The evenings are now only of two hours duration are considered by many attendees particularly first time attenders as a great experience which seem to pass too quickly.

We follow a programme, based on the Holy Father's message for vocations for Vocations Sunday with Eucharistic celebration, Adoration, silent reflection, Rosary for vocations, with guest speakers focusing on priestly and consecrated religious vocations, concluding with Night prayer and Benediction.

Serra International Foundation

Serra International founded in 1935 is not a fund raising organization, however by 1951 it became obvious that having a formal method of giving financial aid to programs that foster and promote vocations to the ministerial priesthood of the Catholic Church and give financial aid to programs of formation for men and women of consecrated religious life became necessary.

Such a charitable foundation was formed in 1951 to promote and assist vocations to seminaries and religious houses. This would conform to our main purposes of being.

They are then assessed by the trustees of the foundation for conformity and validity and if successful will receive funds to assist that particular vocations projects.

It is with great sadness that we announce the death of a very dear friend to Serra and priest Fr Bill Tollan. who, with failing health passed away in Herbert House, Freshfield. Liverpool in the early hours of Sunday, the 5th Jan 2025, on the Feast of the Epiphany.

For some 12 years from 1970 Fr Bill was in Cameroon teaching in Sasse College. he was then transferred to Bishop Rogan College which had just started the A-level programmes. He was appointed as the parish priest of the Cathedral parish of Soppo and chaplain to the Sisters of St. Therese and a member of the Bishop's Council.

Fr Bill was the moving force behind the Charismatic Renewal in Buea and Bamenda Dioceses and the organizing secretary to the Kumba Catholic Convention held in the late '70's. In 1982 he returned to Scotland as rector of St. Joseph's College, Lochwinnoch and bursar for the British Region. He oversaw the transfer from Lochwinnoch to Cardonald in Glasgow in 1985. In 1988, he was one of the delegates to the General Chapter and was elected to the Society's General Council holding the portfolio for Finance and Latin America. December 2001, he was elected Society Representative in Cameroon. December 2007, he was appointed to Cardonald to help with Mission Appeals, animation and the editing of the St. Joseph's Advocate magazine.

On the 1st of November 2010, he was appointed Rector at Cardonald and during that time became a close friend and confidant to Glasgow Serrans. He celebrated the Eucharist with us and was a frequent speaker on religious art, one of his favourite topics.

The Synod on Synodality 2020/24 eagerly expected since 2021 has now been released. On Saturday afternoon, 26 October, the members of the Second Session of the XVI Ordinary General Assembly of the Synod of Bishops approved the Final Document. Pope Francis approving its publication.
