Cookies Policy

What is a cookie?

A “cookie” is a small text file that’s stored on your computer, tablet or phone when you visit a website.

Some cookies are deleted when you close down your browser. These are known as session cookies. Others remain on your device until they expire or you delete them from your cache. These are known as persistent cookies and enable us to remember things about you as a returning visitor.

How to control cookies

Cookies can be controlled and managed in various ways. Please bear in mind that removing or blocking cookies can impact on your user experience on a website.

Browser controls

Most browsers will allow you to see what cookies you have and delete them on an individual basis or block cookies from particular or all websites. Be aware that any preference you have set will be lost if you delete all cookies, including your preference to opt-out from cookies as this itself requires an opt-out cookie to have been set. How we use cookies

Our website only create one Cookie and this cookie is ‘Absolutely Necessary’ for the functioning of your website. This cookie is called ‘ASP.NET_SessionId’ and it stores a ‘Session ID’ which is used by Microsoft .NET Framework to deliver the web pages to the visitor. This cookie also expires at the end of the session which is when a visitor goes to another website or closes their browser window.

Because this cookie does not remain on your computer it has no way of tracking your website usage or retaining any of your data post expiry. This means consent is not required.

Cookie Name: ASP.NET_SessionId

Google Analytics to track visitors and measure traffic to their website. You are able to add the Google Analytics code directly to your website and start collecting data right away. We understand that the ICO do not view Google Analytics cookies as intrusive and they do not require 'explicit consent' from websites who use these cookies. We recommend updating your Privacy Policy or adding your own Cookie Policy to the footer of your website to confirm what you as a firm do with the data your Google Analytics collects.
