# Letter from Fiona McWilliams Executive Director of Development Natural History Museum

#### **Dear Residents**

Happy new year. I hope this finds you and your families well and that you were able to enjoy a good Christmas break.

As you know the Museum has been closed since 16 December, and unfortunately due to the new restrictions it looks like we will have to remain closed for some weeks. We will of course keep you informed of our plans when we have further news of reopening. In the meantime, though our public galleries are closed, our science work and activities continue – and we thought you might appreciate an update.

#### NHM Documentary Series on Channel 5

As you may have seen, the NHM is currently featuring a new four-part documentary series on Channel 5 *The Natural History Museum: World of Wonder* which was filmed over several months during 2020. If you haven't had a chance to watch, it is certainly worth a look as it explores almost every inch of the Museum - from the spectacular public galleries to our labs and scanning suites and the collection spaces housing tens of thousands of specimens, dissection rooms, and the wildlife garden (and its inhabitants!).

The third episode airs this evening, **Thursday 21 January at 20:00 GMT** and all episodes will be available to view on the video on demand player My5.

#### **Palaeontology Building Facade Repairs**

Following our last update, this project has proceeded at speed and works are currently being carried out both outside and inside the building behind the white wrapping that encloses the scaffolding.

To ensure that disruption is kept to a minimum, we have installed the building site works areas and equipment within the Museum grounds, and placed noise monitors at the perimeter. To reduce noise and additional vibration the contractor is implementing a variety of systems and operating methods such as the use of diamond drilling rather than noisier percussion drilling.

The new façade will improve the fire resistance, security and environmental conditions of the building, ensuring a safer space for both staff and the collections. At the same time, although the external appearance of the building will not be materially affected, the building will look improved thanks to the cleaning of the concrete and the installation of new glass and metal structure. The completion of works is on schedule and are expected to be finished by the end of March.

### **Urban Nature Project**

Following the confirmation from RBKC last October that we could proceed with our gardens transformation plans, the Design Team have been working hard to progress

detailed designs. These will be completed in spring ahead of preparing for construction to begin in the autumn of this year. More details on the design, construction and conservation plans for the gardens will be shared with you later in the year.

We've also now had our first set of results back from the scientific monitoring carried out in the gardens and are beginning the task of analysing the results and sharing the findings. We've been working closely with our national partners to develop the schools programme to be launched later this year, as also with local community groups as we continue to develop our community engagement and volunteering programme.

#### Current exhibitions - even while we are closed!
