Let's not forget the basics – Standard Infection Control Precautions are an essential part of day-to-day practice (for ALL staff)

<u>NHS England » Chapter 1: Standard infection control</u> precautions (SICPs)

- Top Tips for staying well this winter:
 - Workstation Hygiene
 - Respiratory hygiene
 - GI illness follow policy
 - Hand Hygiene







Think about how many hands touch a workstation in one day :

Workstation hygiene:

- Use a combined detergent and disinfectant wipe (e.g. Green Clinell or similar) to clean your keyboard, mouse, telephone and headset at the beginning and end of each shift/ working day. (*Remember to use 1 wipe per surface (do not clean multiple surfaces with the same wipe)*
- Clean using an "S" shape motion to avoid cross contamination
- Allow at least 60 seconds contact time and <u>allow the surfaces to air dry</u>
- Keep your workstation clutter free and clear away personal items at the end of each day. This will ensure that the workstation area can be cleaned properly
- Avoid consuming food at your workstation:
- If there is no alternative clean your workstation and wash your hands before eating. Avoid touching
 any workstation equipment or mobile devices whilst you are eating



Hands are the most efficient way to spread infections:

Hand Hygiene:

- Wash hands with soap and water for at least 20 seconds:
 - On arrival at work
 - After cleaning your workstation
 - After using the toilet
 - After coughing/ sneezing into a tissue
 - Before and after using PPE
 - Before and after refreshment breaks
 - Before preparing food

National Cleaning Standards in Primary Care - update

 Currently national work in designing a tool to support implementation in Primary Care (waiting for National team to approve / upload onto the website above)

However, as a minimum to meet CQC standards you need:

- A Cleaning contract which details cleaning schedules, including frequency, methods & products used
- Regular (suggest monthly) cleaning audits where the cleaning schedule is audited to check the cleaning has been carried out to a suitable standard
- Clinical cleaning logs daily / sessional signing by all clinicians to verify equipment used between each patient
 is cleaned
- Cleaning / decontamination schedules and documentation for specialist equipment used e.g., spirometry, micro suction machinery etc.

On my practice visits I see dust on high (top of curtain rails, door frames) and low surfaces (skirting boards, couch frames) – make sure these areas included on any cleaning audits!
